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MESSAGE FROM THE FOUNDER



2024 will be remembered as a dark year for Children's Rights, in the Philippines as well as across the globe. The findings are alarming: worldwide, more than 370 million girls and women - 1 in 8 - report having been raped or sexually assaulted as children. When online or verbal sexual violence is included, the number rises to 650 million, or 1 in 5 women.

Halfway through the 2030 Agenda for the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), only 15% of the targets are on track, while troubling setbacks are seen in equality, education, and justice. And yet, positive signals are emerging. In 2024, Colombia hosted the first-ever Global Ministerial Conference on Ending Violence Against Children, an important milestone in bringing this issue to the forefront of political and international agendas.

Given the scale of the challenges and risks, the urgency to act is greater than ever. Comprehensive strategies for prevention and support are needed to effectively combat all forms of sexual violence. Breaking the silence is essential: to remain silent in the face of sexual violence is to be complicit, and in such a context, indifference kills. Every voice matters to protect children and to end impunity.

Online Sexual Abuse and Exploitation of Children (OSAEC) is soaring at unprecedented levels: every second, at least two child abuse images or videos are shared online. Recent research warns about the use of generative AI for child abuse purposes, opening the door to new forms of exploitation. This reality demands stronger media and political attention.

Our "MERCI" campaign in France and "BREAK THE SILENCE" campaign in the Philippines, raised public awareness around a clear message: protecting children is everyone's responsibility. More than ever, we must listen to children and young people and place their participation at the center, in line with the spirit of the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child.

In 2024, CAMELEON redoubled its efforts to tirelessly pursue its mission: to heal, protect, prevent, empower and amplify the voices of girl-survivors of sexual violence.

The encouraging results and impact achieved are the fruit of a collective commitment of our teams in France and the Philippines, our volunteers, our partners, and also you, our donors and sponsors, who make our action possible.

In 2025, we must continue and intensify this advocacy and our mission. Together, let us build a more just world where every child can grow up in dignity, safety, and hope.

MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT



2024 proved to be another challenging year for advocates for children's rights as we were faced with not only delayed regulations but also with logistical concerns in our own center due to personnel issues.

Despite these difficulties, we have also seen leaps and bounds of progress in aiding the victims of sexual abuse in the Philippines. In October 2023, the Philippine Supreme Court affirmed the conviction of a father for qualified rape against his minor daughter even if the victim was unable to testify by invoking the doctrine of unavailable child under the Rule on Examination of a Child Witness.

In this case, the victim was prevented by her mother from testifying against her father by sending her away and ensuring that she was not presented in court. The prosecution instead presented the victim's sworn statement and medical reports together with testimonies from the victim's relatives.

The Supreme Court emphasized that the doctrine of unavailable child seeks to prevent the miscarriage of justice by addressing the unique vulnerabilities of child abuse victims. It recognizes that children may be pressured or intimidated into avoiding court appearances, and it provides a pathway for justice in such circumstances.

This decision shows that the Philippine judiciary is eagerly upholding the rights of all child abuse victims by ensuring that legal processes adapt to the realities faced by vulnerable individuals. CAMELEON OVERVIEW

OUR STORY



CAMELEON Association Inc. (CAI) was founded in 1997 by French national Laurence Ligier in response to the growing number of exploited and abandoned children in the Philippines. Established as a non-profit organization, CAI opened its first rehabilitation center in Sablogen, Passi City, to protect children from abuse and help them heal from traumatic experiences while reclaiming their childhood. Shortly after its foundation, CAMELEON was accredited by the Department of Social Welfare and Development (DSWD) and began building strong partnerships in France, Switzerland, Luxembourg, Andorra, the United States, and Belgium.

In 2019, CAMELEON reached another milestone with the inauguration of its second rehabilitation center in Silay City, Negros Occidental. The event, held in collaboration with dedicated local and international partners, underscored the organization's commitment to advancing child protection and empowerment.

By 2022, CAMELEON proudly celebrated its 25th anniversary with a dedicated team Filipino staff and employees from France, serving more than 2,800 children and families through its Rehabilitation and Wellbeing and Community Development Programs across Region VI and Negros Island Region.

- From a hostile environment to a warm and safe life, children change over the years. Like our multi-colored CAMELEON, they move slowly but surely, hesitating, sometimes tumbling but never falling.
- We are building safe structures dedicated to survivors, helping them overcome their trauma and making it into a force for their rehabilitation. We offer a necessary cocoon to prepare for their metamorphosis.
- We aim to change minds and behaviors and are working to change societies and mentalities to protect childhood. Children are at the heart of our actions: changes are made by them, for them, and around them.

- The teams accompany each child in the long term, up until university graduation, while at the same time preparing them for adulthood.
- CAMELEON supports families in becoming more aware of their role as parents and encourages the preservation of family ties.
- Through the practice of circus, an unknown discipline in the Philippines used as an innovative therapeutic tool, the victims reclaim their identity.
- The foundress's energy and determination are transmitted to the teams, the children, and the parents who take ownership of the project bit by bit with audacity, passion, and pride.
- The Association trains and accompanies beneficiaries, children, and adults to become ambassadors of CAMELEON. The virtuous circle is born.
- Individual sponsorship: under its supervision, the Association favors the bond and exchanges between children and their sponsors.
- The awareness-raising in schools with the use of unique pedagogical tools, used during workshops dedicated to children's rights and international solidarity.
- Based in Europe and the Philippines, the Association thrives on intercultural North/South exchanges and favors the sharing of expertise and good practices.

A YEAR IN REVIEW

CAMELEON proudly marks another successful chapter, extending heartfelt thanks to its donors, sponsors and partners for their steadfast support. Their contributions have been crucial in empowering vulnerable abused young girls and economically challenged youth, enabling them to break free from poverty and abuse. Collectively, these efforts have established a network of compassion and empowerment that cross borders, driving meaningful positive change.

- CAMELEON Passi Center has earned DSWD First Level Accreditation, recognizing its compliance with standards in delivering quality residential care for girl-survivors of sexual abuse and effective community-based programs for children, youth, families, and communities.
- In June 2024, CAMELEON Association welcomed a new Executive Director.
- Creation of Board of Trustees Committees (International, Finance, and HR) - CAMELEON strengthened its governance by creating Board of Trustees committees to enhance oversight, ensure accountability, and support strategic objectives for greater organizational efficiency and effectiveness.
- CAMELEON successfully reintegrated 34 girl-survivors of sexual abuse—22 from Passi Center and 12 from Silay Center—highlighting its commitment to rehabilitation, empowerment, and independence.
- Ten girls in the Aftercare Program completed their chosen courses. Eleven girls have gained employment, 9 in Iloilo and 2 in Silay. Three girls are ready for professional certification, 2 in Iloilo and 1 in Silay. This reflects their growth in their well-being, resilience, autonomy, and responsibility.
- Twenty-one girls from Cirquera de CAMELEON performed at the NuStar New Year's Countdown in Cebu City, showcasing their strength and artistry through the organization's Sports and Circus Program. The event raised 5 million pesos for renovation of the Passi Center gymnasium and the expansion of the CAMELEON Negros dormitory that are essential for rehabilitation and wellbeing-interventions.

ACTIONS

CHILD ABUSE IN THE Philippines

Child sexual abuse in the Philippines is a grave and pervasive issue, with official reports from the PNP and PSA showing alarming levels of cases, many of which still go unreported due to stigma, lack of awareness, and barriers in the reporting process. Contributing factors include poverty, social vulnerabilities, and weak enforcement of laws such as the **Anti-Rape Law (RA 8353)** and the **Safe Spaces Act (RA 11313)**. While the government has introduced measures like the **DSWD Child Protection Policy** and awareness campaigns, challenges in prosecuting offenders and providing timely support for victims persist. The **COVID-19** pandemic further worsened risks, leading to a surge in online abuse as children became more exposed to digital exploitation at home.

As of 2024, over 67% of Violence Against Children (VAC) cases involve sexual abuse, with online sexual abuse (0.07%) and online exploitation (0.11%) emerging as growing concerns (<https://www.childprotectionnetwork.org/wp-content/uploads/2025/03/Women-and-Child-Protection-Units-Statistics-2024-aO-2025-0317.pdf>). Offenders use digital platforms for grooming and exploitation, often escaping accountability due to underreporting. In response, government agencies, NGOs, and international partners are working to strengthen policies, create child-friendly facilities, and promote community-based initiatives. However, experts emphasize the urgent need for stronger reporting mechanisms, wider psychosocial support, and sustained multi-sector collaboration. Combating both traditional and online abuse demands innovative, holistic, and urgent action to safeguard the rights and well-being of Filipino children.



OUR PROGRAMS

CAMELEON's programs are built on three major components: healing, building, and preventing. These programs serve as driving forces to achieve CAMELEON's goal of creating a world free from sexual violence.

REHABILITATION AND WELLBEING

CAMELEON primarily focuses on the rehabilitation of young girl-survivors of sexual abuse in Western Visayas. Our Rehabilitation Program consists of two phases: Residential Care (In-House) and Post-Residential Care (After-Care). In addition to addressing their basic needs, each survivor receives psychosocial support and legal assistance, participates in various sports, circus activities, and engages in a range of therapies. After completing their time in our rehabilitation centers, the girls return to their communities, families (when safe), or guardians. While pursuing their education, they may stay at the Iloilo Dormitory or rent a boarding house. The Post-Residential Care Program equips the girls for independent living, fostering their development into active members of society.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

The Community Development Program aims to support partner-beneficiaries and their families in CAMELEON's target communities by providing assistance in education, skills training, and family strengthening. Acknowledging that the sexual abuse of children is often associated with insufficient education and financial resources within families, the program emphasizes strengthening these foundations at the family level while also extending support to the broader community. The ultimate objective is to empower both children and parents to become agents of change, thereby helping to reduce domestic and sexual violence in families and communities.

ADVOCACY

The Advocacy Program serves as a preventive initiative against child sexual abuse and violence. It organizes advocacy campaigns, information drives in schools, and lectures on topics such as safe and unsafe touches for children, children's rights, and the reporting of sexual abuse. These activities aim to educate parents, teachers, stakeholders, and children themselves, functioning as both prevention and early intervention strategies.

Additionally, the program engages in lobbying efforts at local and national legislative councils to promote child protection laws. This enables the organization to represent the voices of sexual abuse victims and work towards the establishment of laws that safeguard them and ensure justice for the crimes committed against them.




REHABILITATION AND WELLBEING

The Rehabilitation and Wellbeing Program provides **personal reconstruction** of girl-survivors of sexual abuse, **aiding their recovery and journey toward independence**. It focuses on meeting their **basic needs** and facilitating **psychosocial interventions** to **promote healing**. Additionally, legal assistance is available for those who choose to take legal action against their perpetrators.

Upon completing the program, survivors are **reintegrated into their families and communities** when deemed safe. On the other hand, they may be placed with foster families, assigned legal guardians, or prepared for independent living.

The program consists of two phases: **Residential (In-House)** and **Post-Residential Care (After Care)**.



IN-HOUSE

Girls admitted to the In-House program reside in centers located in Passi City, Iloilo, and Silay City, Negros Occidental. They participate in **psychosocial interventions** designed to support their **reintegration into mainstream society**. The centers foster a **nurturing family environment** and address the girls' **fundamental needs for healing from the trauma of sexual abuse**. Referrals are made by the Local Social Welfare and Development Offices in Panay, Guimaras, and Negros Islands. On average, the girls spend about three years in the centers before moving on to the After-Care or Post Residential Care Program.



AFTERCARE

After completing the In-House Program and being assessed as ready for reintegration, the girls move on to Post-Residential Care. In this phase, they prepare for independent living by staying at the CAMELEON Dormitory in Iloilo City, reuniting with their biological families if it is considered safe, or residing in boarding houses. This process aids their reintegration into society and fosters autonomy. Support continues until they complete their education, whether in college or vocational school (formal or informal). Furthermore, they receive career guidance and professional orientation to help them secure appropriate careers, ensuring self-sustainability after leaving the program.





The Community Development Program addresses child abuse by **providing education to underprivileged yet deserving children.**


Through a combination of **education, empowerment, exposure, and leadership training**, both children and their parents become **community leaders and agents of change** in the fight against child sexual abuse.

FAMILY DEVELOPMENT

The CAMELEON Family Development Center is committed to **empowering partner families** in nurturing and caring for their children. By assisting parents in enhancing their abilities to fulfill their roles, the center **strengthens family bonds and fosters support systems** among family members.

Recognizing the vital role of the Family Development Center in **complementing the services of the Community Development Program**, collaboration with the program team has been intensified to create a unified approach and operational plans.

Launched in 2021 with support from Fondation Apprentis d'Auteuil (France), the center provides a **safe space for families** to learn and interact, **promoting personal and parental competence**. It offers developmental activities such as **parenting and family-building workshops, life skills training, and alternative livelihood programs**.

Following the operational model of Apprentis d'Auteuil's House of Families, the center has been operational for nearly two years and is managed by Project Staff with assistance from **groups of Parent Champions**. This nurturing environment encourages **connections, relationships, and reflections on parenting experiences** for partner families. The center also conducts community sensitization efforts to reach more families in CAMELEON program areas. Initiatives to engage local partners and stakeholders ensure the project's effectiveness and sustainability.

SUPPORT PROGRAM HEALTH

The Health Program at CAMELEON guarantees that all beneficiaries have **access to healthcare services**, which include **vaccinations, hospitalization, dental care, medical consultations, and psychological support**. The aim is to promote **overall well-being** for both **physical and mental health**.

To foster a healthy community, the program trains young members, referred to as CAMELEON Youth Health Advocates (CYHA), on various health topics that they can present in public lectures.


SUPPORT PROGRAM SPORTS AND CIRCUS



As an innovative intervention for the in-house girls of CAMELEON and a creative tool used in its advocacy campaigns, Social Circus fosters healing and self-expression through art and movement. Ongoing engagement and participation empower them to realize their potential, experience personal freedom, and cultivate a sense of empowerment—essential aspects for their growth and overall well-being.

SUPPORT PROGRAM ANIMAL ASSISTED THERAPY

Animal Mediation focuses on deliberately promoting positive interactions between humans and animals across different domains, including education, social engagement, therapy, and research. One specific application is Animal Assisted Therapy (AAT), which aims to improve the cognitive, physical, psychological, and social health of children who have faced traumatic events, such as survivors of sexual abuse.

In this therapeutic method, girls who interact with carefully chosen animals receive support to enhance their overall well-being and are given a chance to heal and reconstruct their lives following trauma.


ADVOCACY

CAMELEON's Advocacy Program conducts information campaigns aimed at raising awareness and educating the public about children's rights and child sexual abuse, with the primary goal of preventing these issues. The program serves as an early intervention and prevention tool against child sexual abuse for the organization. Its advocacy campaigns target a diverse audience, including parents, children, teachers, community and political leaders, and professionals.

Additionally, the program engages in lobbying activities at both local and national legislative levels to promote child protection laws and policies. The CAMELEON Youth Advocate play an active role in these initiatives by advocating for children's rights and youth reproductive health through lectures and workshops in various communities.

WORKING TOGETHER

FRANCE and LUXEMBOURG

From September to October 2024, Shaline Gamala, Donor Relations Officer at CAMELEON, undertook a mission in Europe to enhance international partnerships, mobilize resources, and support child sponsorship initiatives. This mission fostered the exchange of best practices between CAMELEON France and CAMELEON Philippines.

Shaline engaged with CAMELEON France's staff, Board members, and volunteers, participating in donor meetings and events to raise awareness. She shared impactful testimonies at fundraising events, including a piano concert by CAMELEON Godmother Laure Favre-Kahn.

The mission involved meetings with partners and donors in France and Luxembourg, focusing on children's rights and preventing sexual violence. As a result, critical funds were raised, new child sponsors recruited, and international partnerships strengthened, significantly enhancing CAMELEON's global visibility and support for projects benefiting girl-survivors of sexual abuse and disadvantaged youth in the Philippines.



PHILIPPINES

On July 6, 2024, the inaugural **NUSTAR Ball** was held at the Fili Hotel Grand Ballroom in Cebu, in partnership with Tatler Philippines. The black-tie gala gathered 340 philanthropists, business leaders, and advocates from Cebu and Manila, united in supporting CAMELEON's mission to protect and empower survivors of sexual abuse and disadvantaged children in Western Visayas.

The evening, highlighted by heartfelt remarks from CAMELEON founder Laurence Ligier, successfully raised ₱4.5 million for programs providing safe spaces, education, psychosocial support, and life skills training for children in Iloilo and Negros. Guests also enjoyed curated experiences at NUSTAR Resort & Casino and from Tatler's 2024 Dining Guide.

More than a celebration, the NUSTAR Ball was a powerful demonstration of how generosity and community can transform lives. CAMELEON expressed gratitude to Tatler Philippines, Irene Francisco, NUSTAR leadership, and all generous donors who contributed to making this event a meaningful success.



PHILIPPINES

On December 31, 2024, twenty-one girls from Cirquera de CAMELEON performed at the NuStar New Year's Countdown in Cebu City, supported by four staff members and professional floor director Luc Richard from Cambodia. Their performance highlighted the strength, discipline, and artistry cultivated through CAMELEON's Sports and Circus Program, which aids girl-survivors of sexual abuse and disadvantaged youth.

The event successfully raised **3.7 million pesos** in donations for CAMELEON. These funds will be used for the renovation of the Passi Center gymnasium and the expansion of the CAMELEON Negros dormitory, both of which are vital for providing safe, functional, and enhanced spaces for rehabilitation and empowerment programs.

This collaboration with NuStar not only showcased the talents of CAMELEON beneficiaries but also reinforced the organization's ability to provide long-term support to vulnerable girls and youth in the Philippines.



VOLUNTEERS

The local and foreign volunteers of CAMELEON, through their selflessness and dedication, have been instrumental in expanding the association and training its workforce. These volunteers, deployed by CAMELEON France, hail from various parts of the world and different regions of the Philippines. 
